#### Child Safety: Creating Safe Spaces for Children with Autism:

Children with autism may face unique challenges in navigating their environments, making safety at home a critical priority. Sensory sensitivities, communication differences, and impulsive behaviors can increase the risk of injury or distress if the home isn't thoughtfully adapted. A safe environment, one that is predictable, calming, and responsive to each child's needs, can foster emotional security and may reduce injuries during behavioral incidents.

Caregivers are encouraged to assess potential hazards, establish clear routines, and use visual supports to promote understanding and comfort for their children. Together, the Family Enrichment Center's Autism Is Real program strives to help build homes that nurture both safety and growth for the population we serve by sharing a copy of the Surgeon General's Health Home Checklist.



# Improved literacy Share a story of a child who has shown growth or resilience.

During our Girl Scout troop meetings, we've witnessed meaningful growth in literacy through interactive, hands-on activities. One standout example comes from our "Build a Board Game" activity. This project required girls to write instructions, create storylines, and use critical thinking to design their own games, blending literacy with creativity and STEM.

In our Rowlette Park Troop 96045, one girl in particular, who initially struggled with writing and often hesitated to share her thoughts, showed remarkable progress. As the weeks went on, she began contributing confidently,





eventually helping others shape their ideas and proudly presenting her own. She later shared how combining reading and writing with fun, collaborative STEM challenges made learning feel exciting and empowering. Her journey is a powerful reminder that when girls are given the right tools, teamwork, and supportive space, their confidence and academic skills can flourish together.

### Impact Story: A Season of Growth

Learn & Play Tampa Bay hosts Neighborhood Play Squads at all seven Children's Board Family Resource Centers across the county. These 10-week sessions give families a place to learn, play, and build lasting connections while supporting early childhood development and the journey through parenthood. This summer, a mom and her 4-year-old son joined our Neighborhood Play Squad at the

Brandon Family Resource Center. On the first day, the boy appeared overwhelmed, covering his ears and showing signs of distress throughout the session. Our team introduced his mom to our Neurodiversity-Affirming bin, which includes headphones and sensory tools to help children feel more comfortable.

The following week, he arrived wearing his own headphones and was noticeably calmer, more comfortable, and ready to participate. From then on, he wore them every week—they attended every single session! Over time, he even decorated his headphones with the stickers we handed out at the end of each class.

Throughout the quarter, we watched him blossom—becoming more confident in his communication, social interactions, and creative play. On sensory bin days, he loved the activities so much that he asked his mom to take pictures so they could recreate them at home.



His mom shared how meaningful the program had been for their family. It gave them a reason to get out of the house, connect with others, and support her son's development in a positive, understanding space. She was wonderfully supportive of him and encouraged him to be himself, which was inspiring to see. The other parents in the group also formed a strong, caring community—offering each other empathy and encouragement every week.

# Child Safety: Featuring a camper

This summer at Rooted in Play's Every Child Plays Camp, we had the joy of welcoming Charlotte, a camper with DDX3X syndrome. This rare genetic condition affects speech, motor development, and learning. From the moment she arrived, Charlotte was a bright light, curious, engaged, and eager to connect. Her favorite question quickly became,



"Whatcha doing?" as she explored each play invitation with enthusiasm. Whether she was painting, building, or inventing new games, she jumped into play with enthusiasm and a smile, but nothing topped her love of face painting. What made the week truly special was the way other campers and volunteers were naturally drawn to her. Charlotte was included, celebrated, and deeply loved by the group.



A core value of our camp is that safety and freedom are not opposites; they work together. Instead of controlling play, we teach children how to take healthy risks responsibly. Each day, we used a simple social story created specifically for camp to review safety expectations in a visual, accessible way. We asked campers to: let a playworker know if they needed to leave the play area, tell us if a loose part was broken or unsafe, and stay aware of their surroundings, especially around the play gym. These expectations

empowered children to take ownership of the space and look out for one another, allowing them to play boldly while still staying safe. Charlotte thrived in this environment. With clear routines, visual supports, and caring playworkers nearby, she was able to participate confidently and independently.

Her mother later shared, "I am so grateful Charlotte had the opportunity to attend this camp! It was perfect for her and she had a great time. For me, I felt confident knowing she was safe and well cared for while she was away from me. I hope you're able to continue providing these inclusive opportunities for play for all children!" Charlotte's story is exactly why we do this work. When children are given time, freedom, support, and a safe space to play, they flourish. And when play is truly inclusive, everyone grows.

### Impact Story: A Season of Growth

This summer, with generous support from the Planning Commission, the Children's Board, the American Planning Association, USF's Masters in Urban and Regional Planning Program, and community partners across Tampa, the FLIP Jr. program brought planning to life for elementary and

middle school students through a one-of-a-kind hands-on learning experience.

Throughout the multi-week program, students explored the big question: What makes a community great — and who gets to decide? Through interactive lessons, creative challenges, and field experiences, they discovered how cities are shaped, who is involved in development,

and how planning can serve everyone — including kids, elders, people with disabilities, and future generations. Students learned how to think like planners, developers, and advocates through role-playing, site analysis, sketching, and team design activities. They even met with land use attorneys, who helped break down the development process and the legal side of zoning and land use.

Each year the program has incorporated unique experiences for the children with their favorite visits to various locations, offices, elected officials, taking a boat





up or down Hillsborough River, and riding the trolley as they "plan" their own cities and living spaces. Last year Fatima and Naya took two of the youth to do their presentations at the APA FL annual conference in Jacksonville. The children role-play as elected officials, making decisions on real projects that have come before Tampa City Council and make decisions on whether to approve the proposals. They help to influence real projects during their development.
